INFORMATION FOR TRAVELLERS ENTERING THE TERRITORY OF THE EUROPEAN UNION

The Chief Veterinary Officer informs that in 2014 and 2015 multiple outbreaks of **African swine fever (ASF)** were detected in certain Central and Eastern European countries. Moreover, there were also confirmed cases of detection of the ASF virus presence in products of animal origin manufactured in third countries.

Taking the above into account, the Chief Veterinary Officer reminds that there is an absolute ban on bringing products of animal origin to the European Union.



Foodstuffs containing products of animal origin that are brought to the EU may contain pathogens causing infectious animal diseases, including African swine fever.



Do not let infectious animal diseases to be introduced to the territory of the European Union!

What is African swine fever?

African swine fever (ASF) is a dangerous and highly pathogenic infectious disease of domestic pigs and wild boar.

An important way of the ASF virus spread is the feeding of animals with food waste (swill feeding).

People are not susceptible to the ASF virus and the disease does not pose a threat to their health or life. However, it needs to be underlined that ASF occurrence results in putting a given country at risk of considerable financial losses connected mainly with preventing pigs or pork meat exportation to countries free from the disease.
